Trafalgar School held its first Personal Development Day of the year concentrating on our core value of 'Respect'. Both staff and students were released from their normal timetables for the day and prepared to immerse themselves for the particular focuses given to each year group.

Year 11 took part in a revision conference day and were joined by our external experts 'Positively Mad', who focused on those skills and techniques that will support our Year 11s with their studies and knowledge retention, ready for their forthcoming mock examinations. They had great fun in learning new skills of word association, mind maps and many more top tips! Then it was on to workshops in the afternoon focussing on those important next steps.

Year 8 were considering how to respect their bodies and minds for a healthy lifestyle. There were mindfulness sessions, where they learnt the art of being "in the moment", as well as discussions on a healthy diet. In the afternoon, all of Year 8 chose an activity they wanted to partake in – some practiced Yoga, others chose fitness and a dance session, whilst another group chose to get some fresh air on a local walk to get rambling active!

Year 9 were discussing sex and consent, with a focus on respectful relationships. Students considered a variety of scenarios and discussed "What if...?" as well as learning about contraception and some tricky STIs!

Year 10s were focused on Sex, Drugs and Alcohol for the day, with some honest and frank discussions on the impact of these on the body and mind. There was also a session with a banana, which provided lots of information – and a few giggles!

Charity was the word for Year 7s, as they spent the day researching local charities to find out more information about them and what it is that they do. This was completed in houses with each group producing a poster/powerpoint to support some amazing presentations. Each group then gave a presentation on why their charity was so important and how people could support the cause. Each House selected 2 winning groups, who went head to head in a house vote to determine the house charity for the year.

Year 7 were lucky to be joined by the UNLOC Team from Portsmouth University. The challenge was set to unlock their resilience using real life experiences and develop their team working skills, which were put to the test when students had to instruct a partner to draw whilst blindfolded!

Year 8's spent the day learning all about the Duke of Edinburgh Award. They were then challenged to utilise their skills in map reading, orienteering, as well as learning about first aid!
