Salterns Academy Trust response to increased risks of Cyber attacks

The DfE and the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) have made schools aware of an increasing number of cyber-attacks involving ransomware infections affecting the education sector recently. They have asked schools to urgently review their existing defences and take the necessary steps to protect their networks.

What action has been taken?

- Implemented Multi factor Authentication
- Commissioned a cyber security company to audit the Trust's networks
- Using our internet provider to restrict what is allowed to enter and leave the school network.

What can you do to help?

- Passwords Choose a secure password; for best practice use larger passwords with combinations of characters (uppercase, lowercase), numbers and special characters. Try not to use something that could be easily guessable like pet names and the place in which you live! Also, if you need to change your password, make sure you use a completely different password and not one that has been used in the past or with an extra character on the end!
- **Emails** –Do not open any attachments from sources that you do not know. It may also be good to check who the emails have come from (do the names match up to the email address?) If you ever have any questions, do not be afraid to ask any of the IT team in the school! Please be extra vigilant with emails, even if an email has come to you from a trusted source, that account may have been compromised. If the attachment or link is not something that you would expect from that person, make sure to check if it is something they have sent.
- **Websites** Make sure that the website that you are going to is https://www.google.co.uk the correct one! Quite often people will spoof websites for us to log in and give away our personal details and passwords. All secure and verified websites will have a padlock next to them in the search bar.
- Any questions/comments, please talk to your IT support team who will be able to help.

Community Circles Update

This week our tutor community circles were answering the following check in question:

"Which do you value most: physical health or mental health?"

Students were keen to put emphasis on both types of health and many said that the pandemic made them realise how much their mental health was affected by not seeing people and friends. One student said, "the reason why community circles are so important to me is that it gives me an opportunity to connect with others, which really helps me with my mental health when I feel stressed or down".



Whilst physical health was also recognised for its importance, quite a few students felt both were closely linked and difficult to separate as one tends to affect the other. Strategies for staying healthy were also widely discussed.
