

MFL Department Update

Our students have been working extremely hard during this term and they are becoming excellent linguists. Now that their first assessments are approaching, it is very important to revise all the vocabulary they have learnt so far. There are multiple strategies to improve memory recall and increase retention of information.

For example, some of the Year 8's have created excellent mind maps using dual coding and colour coding to help them remember the words.

Another excellent tool is Memrise. Every student who is currently doing languages has access to this app. Our Year 7's are already working with this to help them memorise their vocab and perfect their spelling whilst winning points for our house competition!



A combination of techniques is key for excellent progress, you just need to know what works best for you!

Class Charts Update

As many of you will be aware, we have taken the decision to move away from our parent portal, Insight, to a programme called Class Charts. We believe this will prove to be a more user friendly and reliable system for school staff, parents and students to access.

Class Charts provides many of the features found in Insight: tracking attendance, rewards, home learning and students timetables, all in real time. However, it is far more easily accessible from any smart device or computer. We believe this will improve the connection between school and home.

Class Charts have produced a parent user guide which has been emailed to you. However, should you find that you are having any problems accessing or using Class Charts, please do not hesitate to get in touch via email: studentservices@trafalgarschool.org.uk.

It is important to note, in using this new system, students no longer require paper diaries as they can access their timetable and important information via their Chromebook.

We anticipate all students and parents will have moved to Class Charts by half-term and therefore will phase Insight out after that time.

What parents and schools need to know to keep children safe from the latest dares, scares, threats & challenges

There are always stories going round about nasty things online and you may be asked to share warnings about them. The ones with clever names and funny pictures are usually fakes and hoaxes, but of course bad things happen online too and we all want to keep young people safe from them.

Whether a scare is real or not, we would advise against sharing warnings about specific challenges or even 'bad apps', sites or games. Read on to find out why...and what to do instead.



Why shouldn't we share specific warnings?

Scare-shares can cause:

- 1. A false sense of security
- 2. Free publicity
- 3. Unproductive panic

What can we do instead?



- 1. Talk about GENERAL risks and what can go wrong online wherever you are
- 2. Use NON-SCARY EXAMPLES to talk about how to respond to dares, challenges, scares and threats
- 3. Make sure children and young people know who to talk to and where to get **HELP** from different sources
- 4. Focus on the POSITIVES after all, if we say it's all bad, they won't listen to us
