Awareness Month - Black History Month Quiz Answers

Elsie from our Student Leadership Team has put together a short quiz on Black History Month that students have been doing in tutor time. Have a go at home and see how many you can get right! We'll publish the answers in next week's edition of the bulletin!

1) When did the celebration of Black History month begin?



A. 1970

Black History Month was first proposed by Black educators and the African-American Students at Kent State University in February 1969. The first celebration of Black History Month took place at Kent State a year later, from January 2 to February 28, 1970. (1987 in the UK)

2) Which US President first officially recognised Black History Month?

C. Gerald Ford

President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976, calling upon the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

3) When did racial discrimination become illegal in the United Kingdom?

B. 1965

The Race Relations Act 1965 was the first piece of legislation in the UK to address the prohibition of racial discrimination and followed previously unsuccessful bills. The Act banned racial discrimination in public places and made the promotion of hatred on the grounds of 'colour, race, or ethnic or national origins' an offence.

4) What is the first name of this famous tennis player (pictured right)?

C. Serena

Serena Jameka Williams is an American inactive professional tennis player. She was ranked world No. 1 in singles by the Women's Tennis Association for 319 weeks, including a joint-record 186 consecutive weeks.

5) Who was the first African American to refuse to give up their seat on a bus?

B. Claudette Colvin


15 year old Claudette Colvin: the woman who refused to give up her bus seat – only nine months before Rosa Parks. It was a spring afternoon in 1955 when a teenager's spontaneous act of defiance changed US history.



6) How long did the Montgomery bus boycott last?

A. 13 months

Sparked by the arrest of Rosa Parks on 1 December 1955, the Montgomery bus boycott was a 13-month mass protest that ended with the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that segregation on public buses is unconstitutional.



B. Martin Luther King JR

The "I Have a Dream" speech, delivered by Martin Luther King, Jr. before a crowd of some 250,000 people at the 1963 March on Washington, remains one of the most famous speeches in history.

8) Who was the first African American to play professional basketball?

C. Moses Fleetwood Walker

He was the first African American to play pro basketball. The legacy of Moses "Fleet" Fleetwood Walker as the first African American to play basketball professionally is changing the narrative of sport history.

9) Who was the famous Black nurse who died in London after saving many british soldiers during the Crimean War?

A. Mary Seacole

Mary Jane Seacole was a british-jamaican nurse who funded her own trip to crimea, now apart of ukraine, established the british hotel which was provide to injured or sick soldiers and helped countless lives during the war


10) What was the name of law that enforced segregation in the US?

C. Jim Crow law

It was a state and local law which enforced racial segregation in the southern united states. This law lasted for around 100 years from the civil war era until 1968.



BE YOURSELF - You are not the problem and don't let them change you.

Remember, YOU ARE NOT ALONE - Many people experience and overcome bullying.

The earlier you TELL AN ADULT YOU TRUST the better - this could be a teacher, parent/ carer, social worker or family member.

DON'T RESPOND or retaliate - sometimes a reaction is exactly what bullies are

Take SCREENSHOTS of any nasty messages or comments sent over text or social media, then delete the message. This means you have evidence of what the bully has

PROTECT YOUR ACCOUNTS with long, strong passwords. Don't share your passwords with anyone, even best friends.

Learn how to BLOCK and REPORT someone online at h2bsafetycentre.com

Control who sees what you post online with your PRIVACY SETTINGS.

If the bully is THREATENING you, you should report

BLOCK, REPORT and DELETE the bully.

Take a BREAK from your phone and computer; spend some time doing things you enjoy.







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
